### 1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

The college integrates the principle 'man-making and character-building' in harmony with the various present day's issues like Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in its curriculum.

**Professional Ethics:** Proper understanding of the subjects and its applications and scopes, exposure to recent advances in research and individual project works and field studies lay the foundation for easy access to employment among our students. It also helps to inculcate the professionalism in career. Each practical based paper has one portion related to Good Laboratory Practice for better performance in laboratory. Moreover, in The course work of Ph.D. students one portion is present which is called Research Ethics.

**Gender:** The College is an integral part of the Ramakrishna Mission working along the lines laid down by great personalities like Sri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Sri Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda. They had always preached highest reverence for all, both men and women, as the veritable manifestations of God. Imbibing that spirit, the institution advocates worshipful adoration for every human being. This idea is inculcated informally through the daily inter-personal dealings and conversations and formally through seminars and discourses on the ideals of the Ramakrishna Mission. It is to be noted that though the college is only for male students but highest honour and glory of women as the Divine Mother Herself is an integral feature of the institution. During the Annual Free Cataract operation, many women patients along with other male patients are also admitted for the operation and served with due care and honour by the students, staff and volunteers in the college itself. In the Genetics portion of Botany, Zoology and Microbiology students deals the scientific study of the gender issues and its role in heredity and progeny.

**Human Values:** As already pointed out, the institution inculcates the spirit of reverence and service towards all through a very natural way. However, any complaint or grievance is given a patient hearing and necessary actions are taken accordingly. The college has introduced the Value Education and Indian Culture in its Skill Enhancement Course. Moreover many courses are taught each year as the certificate course for adding values in the existing curriculum.

**Environment and Sustainability:** It is an integral part of the curriculum provided by the College and is common for all the Departments. Field studies pertaining to the Dept. of Botany, Microbiology and Zoology provide a first hand experience about nature and her crises. The college organises many seminar throughout the year related to Environment protection and Sustainability. **2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity**

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

Evaluation is the only measurement of an individual's education. The very process of assessment begins with an admission test followed by viva voce. Further stages of assessment are as follows:

- In the first few weeks of education, each department tries its best to find out the weakness and strengths of their newcomers.
- Every department has their program and curriculum to help their students with their specific requirement. Deficiency and proficiency on any issues are identified at the early stages of education. There are programs like short bridge courses, language, and technical skill development, and personal guidance to overcome the student's weaknesses as well as enhance their proficiencies. Outside of these curricula students are guided separately.

- Every department tries to follow a few programs to provide extra care and guidance to the students separately, who fail to perform up to the mark in their annual examination.
- Each department arranges remedial courses as per their need.
- There are provisions of bridge courses for weaker students. Few special classes are organized for these students to achieve the expected level of knowledge. In addition to this, there are also group and one to one discussion.
- The departments facilitated with laboratory arrange a special program for newcomer students, to make them familiar with various instruments and tools.
- Each department tries to focus on a three-tire format to find out Advanced learners: a) performance in the admission test and interview, b) classroom interaction, and c) performance in the institutional examinations.

The college helps and guides its advanced students to reach the pinnacle of efficiencies in various ways:

- The college provides special coaching with internal teachers and external experts for national/state-level competitive examinations like JAM, JEST; entrance tests for ISI, IACS, IISERs, JNU, JU, or other universities, etc at the UG level. For the PG level students are prepared for M.Phil, Ph.D. entrance tests, as well as NET, SET, GATE, SSC, etc.
- Apart from all these, advanced students are encouraged to take participate in various academic discourses inside and outside the institution.

### 2.3.4 - Preparation and adherence to Academic Calendar and Teaching Plans by the institution

- The college Prospectus gives a clear idea of our courses offered, the history of the college, the disciplines to be maintained in the college campus.
- The college has a detailed academic calendar which is distributed to the students at the commencement of every academic session.
- The teachers of every Department, at the beginning of the each semester and during the semester as well, elaborately discusses with the students about the teaching plans-its design, progress, difficulties in implementation, modification and receive feedbacks from the students. A strict adherence and maintenance in regards to the academic calendar are followed and the same is distributed among the students and the teachers.
- Our college organizes a parent-teacher meeting in general with the administration and also with the respective departments where they can get the progress report of their ward from the teachers and they also voice their issues and

concerns for teaching plans and mental counselling.

- The teachers of different departments meet together with the Examination Committee, IQAC and administration to analyse academic calendar, evaluation issues and teaching plans the modalities, expectations, shortcomings, constrains and strategies to overcome difficulties.
- At the very beginning of each semester the respective Departments prepare a detailed routine, a study plan for each individual course and assignments for evaluating the course. The teachers are allocated classes in the routine which is displayed at the students' notice board in front of the respective departments. Assignments are also specified for the teachers for each semester and put up in the departmental notice board.
- The Administration and/or Department of Controller of Examinations holds a meeting at the beginning of every academic year with the students to orient them for the examinations pattern, schedule and regulations. These details are put up on the notice board as well.
- Individual teacher provides course outline and course schedule prepared by the respective departments at the commencement of each semester.
- The success of the process is maintained through effective monitoring by the Principal/Controller of Examinations /HODs. Through the full cooperation of all teaching staffs all the departments have completed the entire teaching learning and assessment process within the stipulated time.

- At present, the college follows CGPA system in grading.
- The semester system of the college has been introduced since 2017.

The steps/medium taken by the college to inform and aware the students about the evaluation processes are:

- Briefing to students by the Principal and the Controller of Examinations
- All departments follow internal-external expertise combination in paper setting, moderation, and evaluation in UG and PG Programs to achieve utmost objectivity in the grading of marks.
- The Controller of Examination maintains a peer-reviewer group to examine draft question papers before finalization. Further modification and improvisation are done to provide error-free question papers to examinees.
- Evaluators are encouraged to point out mistakes and put corrective remark while evaluating a paper so that a student will benefit when they get to relook their paper.
- Students can get a chance to appeal for re- evaluation.
- Besides this, the college provides an academic calendar in advance. However, students are given opportunities to appeal for substitute dates of examination within the fixed tenure while considering personal constraints.
- After the finalization of the examination schedule, a draft copy is circulated among all departments and to students. After receiving all the feedback and necessary guidance of modulation the examination schedule is finalized. This final schedule is strictly maintained.
- Students are being intimated about the schedule of

examination in advance.

- The controller of examination reserves its confidentiality while dispersing answer scripts or paper setting and moderation to external experts as well as collecting them. The entire process is done by the office staff personally. All these stages have smoothed the entire examination exercise within the schedule.

- Drop out is almost nil in this period.
- Although in some papers, students are required to appear in some arrear papers, but considering the total number of papers and students, it is also negligible, specially in core courses.
- Students of UG level, in maximum, prefer to opt for higher studies. Many students get chances to study in institutes like ISI, TIFR, IISC, IACS, IITs, IISERS, NIBMG, BHU, HCU etc. It is interesting to note that a good number of students get chances to study I-PhD programmes competing with the students of PG levels of other institutes.
- Some students opt for jobs - in private sector or in public sector. They also crack it within a couple of years.
- Students studying this college feel an urge to know more and thus they opt for different summer programmes, internships and some also take up some courses through online mode (NPTEL, SWAYAM etc).

## RESEARCH, INNOVATIONS AND EXTENSION

### 3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities

3.1.1 - The institution's research facilities are frequently updated and there is a well-defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

**Research policies:** We have a well-formed Research Policy made under the guidance of our Research Committee, while the corresponding departments have their Ph.D. committees. This policy is regularly revised, updated and uploaded in our website. We take appropriate measures to maintain the research ethics according to the latest UGC guideline. Possible plagiarism detection is done through a software available in our affiliating university.

**Research facilities:** We have State-of-the-art research laboratories for Physics and Chemistry departments, with sophisticated instruments like Flow Cyclometer, Flourimeter, IR Spectrophotometer, Flash Chromatography, Cyclic Voltmeter, HPLC, HPTLC, GCMS, and several high-end servers. All these high-end equipment and servers are maintained under respective AMC.

**Promotion of Research:** In commemoration of 150th Birth Anniversary of Swami Vivekananda, we conceived in 2013 the establishment of a

research Centre in our College. In persuasion to this idea, we duly got recognized as a research Centre under West Bengal State University. The University then granted us the permission to start Swami Vivekananda Centre for Multidisciplinary Research in Basic Science and Social Science to conduct Ph.D. courses. We conduct Course-work towards registration of enrolled Ph.D. scholars, where a special focus is given on the Research Methodologies as an integral part of the course work. The Institution has the requisite infrastructure to conduct Post-Doctoral Research work also. Research centre also facilitates publication of research papers and books/monographs. We have conducted a seminar on IPR (intellectual Property Rights) with a focus on Patent laws of Scientific research.

Even before the formal inception of Research Centre, Dr. Chandrakanta Bandyopadhyay and Dr. Tapas Ghosh of Chemistry Department, (registration was under the University of Calcutta), Dr. Biswajit Ghosh of Botany Department (registration was under Calcutta University) and Dr. Swapan Kumar Ghosh of Botany Department (registration was under Kalyani University) were involved in guiding PhD students. After the establishment of Research Centre, we have constructed in due course, a dedicated research wing in the new Annex building, and some young faculties have got involved in research under its aegis.

Some of our students in Computer Science are trained to begin startups on their own. The Skilled oriented PG Diploma course in Agriculture Biotechnology offered by the college is designed to enable the student towards entrepreneurship in Plant Tissue Culture.

Our aim is to ignite the young minds in search of knowledge, rather than merely burdening them with ever-growing and overpowering pool of information around us. In other words, it also attends to their overall growth and development so that they may become strong and healthy individuals with sound moral principles, learn to respect higher values of life and become conscious of their obligations to the poor masses around them. It does all this and much else besides, not only by instruction but also by involving the inmates in a series of well-planned activities. This creates an elevating experience for the students towards a feeling of oneness with the society. Towards imbibing these value system every year at the beginning of the academic session (both in UG and PG), we organize number of Induction Programs for the freshers, wherein they get the idea of service to the mankind by giving priority to the benefit of the others in the society at large than their individual interest and benefit. This ideology of giving importance to selfless altruism against petty self-interest is being inculcated amongst our students for past fifty eight years uninterruptedly. This practice is then continued throughout the tenure of their stay here by a well-thought and accordingly designed course on Value education, which is a compulsory part of the curriculum, of which the classes are usually taken the Monastic members of the Ramakrishna Order. We also occasionally organize seminar/workshops on various social emerging issues towards creating social awareness among our students. The impact of this training can be seen in their future life, where many of them are found to get associated with reputed philanthropic serving NGOs and in turn we invite them to interact with us towards training and orienting our students such that they may feel and realize the problems regularly faced by the people in the neighbourhood community. Some alumni even establish such NGO of their own for social service. Every year we organize Blood donation camp at our College through the aegis of Association for Voluntary Blood Donors, WB, where our students and staff donate blood. Moreover, every year we organise a free Eye operation camp ( IOL) for the people residing in remote villages, slums and railway platforms where 50-60 people have been operated and spectacles are also given to them. Ideas

pertaining to Communal harmony, Cleanliness (Swachchhata) and environmental awareness are preached and practiced.

Models to aid teaching Dedicated Computer laboratories, apart from the department of Computer Science, in the departments of Mathematics, Physics, Microbiology and Chemistry. All other departments also have their own independent computer facilities as per their academic need. Apart from the College Library and the departmental libraries, we have a District library in the Campus catering to the students and teachers. We have Seminar library in each of the departments with rich collection of reference books which students are allowed to borrow. Access to e-Book and e-journals are made available through Inflibnet. There is a dedicated computer center for the students, with 120 All-in-one computers with internet facility. Photocopying facility is available in the campus. There are separate and fully equipped state-of-the-art laboratories in the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology departments for the students of UG and PG, apart from a number of research laboratories. Students are encouraged to participate in a variety online NPTEL courses, for which our College is a Nodal Centre with one a faculty designated as a one-point contact. The college has one Polyhouse and 2 Green houses.

## 4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

A well-organized and well-maintained library with a rich collection makes the institution even greater. The College Library started its journey way back in 1963 merely with a few almiraahs of books. With the passage of time, it has got bigger and better in all senses - documents, users and staff. The library was earlier situated in the main college building. On 2018 the new College Annex Building was inaugurated and since then the College Library has been shifted to this Annex. The newly built library is housed on 1st floor of the Annex Building.

There is sufficient seating capacity in the Reading Room and it is equipped with different types of books - Text Books, Reference Books, Competitive Books, Journals & Magazines. The e-Library is the new addition to the library which is equipped with 20 All-In-One PCs, Internet connectivity through Wifi, Printer, and 2 OPAC terminals. Both Reading Room and E-Library are under CCTV surveillance. The students are allowed unlimited access to Internet strictly for academic purposes. They are also provided with unlimited Printing facility.

The day-to-day operations of the Library is managed by an Integrated Library Management Software, namely KOHA.

The library subscribes to NLIST (e-ShodhSindhu). The Library has also purchased e-books from renowned publishing house namely Pearson and Springer. The e-books have been purchased on perpetual mode. The Pearson e-books can be accessed from anywhere using user id and password while the Springer e-books can be accessed within the College premises.

## 5.4 - Alumni Engagement

### 6.1.2 - Effective leadership is reflected in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Decentralization and participative management are undoubtedly two interlinked key features for any institute run with a modern outlook towards excellence. While we have several sub-committees constituted with our teaching/non-teaching/monastic members, looking into corresponding matters under their respective jurisdictions, one example of such initiative, that is being followed in our institution can be seen in our ADMISSION PROCESS for both UG and PG level. We highlight some salient features of the same, showcasing our practice in this regard.

- At the suitable time (usually some days before the publication of the result of the corresponding pre-requisite examination [e.g. Higher Secondary for the case of UG, while for PG, final examinations of the UG level] the Principal holds a meeting of the Examination and Admission Committee (which includes all the HOD) to discuss and frame the policy of admission for that year, where the following issues are discussed at length and finalized.
- Eligibility criterion for online filling of the form [viz. Cut-off marks in the last admissible examination ] Subject(s) for which a student has to write the admission test of a particular department
- Date(s) of Admission test (avoiding, if possible, the already announced dates of the other reputed institutions)
- Selection Criterion (viz. making of specific formula for the preparation of final list, giving appropriate weightages to the marks scored in our admission test and that in specific subject(s) of the qualifying examination, about which the respective Heads come with specific suggestions that are chalked out at their departmental level discussions a priori ).
- Syllabus, Question pattern (MCQ/Short or Broad Answer Type) and distribution of marks.
- Fixing of fees for the form-filling process (to be done

ONLINE compulsorily)

- Date of submission of the question paper prepared by the respective departments, and that of the evaluated answer scripts to the Controller of Examination [which is then put in computer for the preparation of the merit list according to the prescribed formula, by the designated members of the College office under the supervision of the Controller of Examination.]
- Specific assignment of duties [Teachers / Non-teaching staff] for the date(s) of Admission test(s), towards smooth operational and logistic support on the particular date(s).
- Date of Counseling for the 1st merit list, 2nd merit list [and a 3rd as well, if necessary for some department]

On the date of admission, all the teaching and non-teaching staff of the College has to attend compulsorily to perform his specific assigned duty towards smooth organization of the Admission test.

After admission Test on the day of Counseling after the publication of the merit list online, the Principal and a few other Monastic Members and the Head of the corresponding department meet the candidate along with his parent/guardian where his need for financial help is assessed and accordingly partial or full free studentship is provided to the needy ones.

## 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ Perspective plan has been clearly articulated and implemented

The college chalks out its strategic plan every year at the outset of the academic session. Concerned bodies and members are consulted and the plans are finalized. After that relevant measures are taken up to deploy the plan.

As it was felt that we are in dearth of space, related to lecture rooms, smart classes, library along with multi-level stack rooms,

reading rooms with ICT facilities and, to facilitate the expansion of research laboratories and administrative offices, it was decided in 2014 to solve all these problems through the construction of a new annex building that will provide all these above-mentioned facilities along with a modern state-of-the-art auditorium. The initial financial support was sanctioned by the Govt. of West Bengal. However, thanks to the kind successive financial commitments and or donations of several Well-wishers of the Ramakrishna Mission in general and our Institution in particular, by on 2018 the opening of the 5 storied building with an auditorium with 250 seating capacity.

Library is shifted to the 1st floor of the new building with all facilities like Reading Room, Stack Room, Processing Room, Storage space, etc.

The whole Department of Mathematics is shifted to the 2nd floor of the new building with spacious 2 computer laboratories, PG class rooms and the space for Ph.D. students.

The newly formed Department of Computer Science is housed in the 2nd floor of the building with three well equipped Computer laboratories and spacious classrooms.

Moreover 2 Studios are present on the 1st floor for the preparation of the online study materials for the faculties. A well furnished Language laboratory is also present on the 1st floor.

6 well furnished GUEST Rooms are present in this building which will help for the accomodation of the reputed faculty members from outside the state.

A GYMNASIUM with all state of art equipments is present on the ground floor of the building.

### 6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for their career development/ progression

The institution has always been keen in its approach towards safeguarding the welfare of its employees, teaching or Non-teaching alike. It also facilitates in all possible ways to the career development or progression of all its employees.

For the teachers in substantive Government approved posts, the College

- Grants Sabbatical leave for higher studies (e.g., Ph.D.) as per the UGC and Government rules
- Grants seed money towards travel/registration for attending Seminars/Symposiums, if required
- Timely processes the relevant documents and paper-works towards formation of necessary committees etc. for their career advancement.

For the Non-teaching staff in Government approved posts, the College

Ensures the timely preparation and processing of the documents regarding their Government approved career advancement scheme at

the 7th, 10th and 20th years of their service.

There is a staff welfare society, named Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Centenary College Cooperative Credit Society, where all the permanent staffs members (both teaching and non-teaching, in substantive Government payroll) can apply for personal loan whenever necessary, as per the Cooperative rules framed by the Government. It is a registered body, run by the elected Board of Directors chosen out of its members in its AGM and the College provides free of cost the physical infrastructure necessary for running its office and takes the responsibility to deduct the requisite amounts, if any, against the repayment of loans for any loanee member through its accounts department.

Moreover, as and when any staff approaches for loan from his Provident Fund accumulation the college immediately pass his appeal in the Governing Body and arrange quick sanction of the loan from treasury office. After superannuation, all staff members get their pensionary benefits including Leave Salary and Gratuity, etc.

## 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Financial audit of the College is conducted in three phases generally.

1. Internal Audit Team, appointed by the Ramakrishna Math, Belur, appoints one auditor team who audits

- Individual vouchers for all the expenditures
- Bank reconciliation statement
- Professional tax and GST documents

At this stage of audit, the monthly statements of receipts and payments is sent to the Central office of the Ashrama, which is finally submitted to the Ashrama headquarter at Belur Math.

1.A Statutory audit team, appointed by Belur Math, headquarters of RKM Ashrama, which visits the College annually and prepares an annual report on the basis of evaluation of the audit done by the

Internal Audit Team. In fact, they check through the four (quarterly) reports of internal audit done by the Internal audit team and also evaluates the action taken with regards to those reports. The team also looks into the Annual bank reconciliation statement, outstanding payments and outstanding receipts, yearly balance sheet, income and expenditure statements, and financial schedule (investment and permanent funds).

2.The Audit Team, appointed by the Government of West Bengal, visits the accounts section of the College once a year and examines the documents related to Government funding, fees and charges of the students, Provident Fund and Tax related documents and also cross checks the Utilization certificates of all the relevant fund received from the Government.

Since the College is SIRO [Scientific and Industrial Research Organization] accredited by DST (Department of Science and Technology) Govt. of India, any devotee of Ramakrishna Mission in general, or any well-wisher of our Institution in particular, who wants to donate towards the research and development of our College, is entitled to get 100% tax exemption for the donation amount, under section 35/1/2 (or 80GGA) of Income Tax act. For this, as per the Government rules we submit every year, the annual audited statement of accounts to the IT department and every three years we have to send necessary documents for the renewal of this scheme.

Two important thrust area of the IQAC:

- We strongly feel that in-depth research is of paramount importance in the advancement of teaching-learning process. That is how, under the active guidance and leadership of IQAC, the College took up several initiatives towards Continuous Expansion of Research Facilities during the last five years as can be seen from the detailed information uploaded in the link. A group of young energetic faculty members took up several research projects and the relevant instrumental up-gradation and procurement of several sophisticated scientific equipment have been done in this period, particularly in the departments of Chemistry, Zoology and Botany. During this period the Research Centre was established in our College, where students can enroll for Ph.D. degree.
- The IQAC in collaboration of the HoDs and administration regularly monitors the academic progress of the students. At the end of the each examination there is an analysis with HoDs to identify the slow learners and advanced ones and decide the steps to be adopted for both the groups as required. In fact, the learning outcomes of the students are discussed almost at individual level and the students are called and / or met individually and collectively to know their suggestions and / or constraints. After admission also, students learning levels come under the scrutiny and suitable bridge courses are organised at departmental level. For slow learners remedial sessions are organised and for the advanced learners seminars, workshops etc are conducted. They are also encouraged to take part in internship or summer courses organised by other reputed institutes. Final performance of our learners are also mapped with the courses offered at the end of the programme by the IQAC along with HoDs.

Introduction of CBCS for both UG and PG programs. The education plays enormously significant role in building of a nation. As an educational institution, engaged in imparting knowledge, we have entered into semester system with CBCS pattern prescribed by UGC. Under the active guidance of IQAC, from 2017, we introduced CBCS with credit based grading system for all UG courses. Then from the academic session 2018, we introduced CBCS with credit based grading system for all PG courses.

Direct Surveillance of IQAC After every End-Semester examination of our College, once the result is prepared, the IQAC meets to supervise the development of the students and suggest required mentoring/guidance/remedial measures to them through their respective heads of the departments, who are invited to attend those meetings, unless they were members of IQAC.

For advanced students 1.Departmental Seminar by invited experts of the corresponding fields to expose them to the frontiers of their knowledge domain so as to motivate such students towards research 2.Special coaching for different National/State level competitive examinations by the help of the college teachers and by the help of the external agencies.

- Our College being the local chapter of NPTEL, an online platform for learning almost any subject across various disciplines at any time of a day, the advanced students are encouraged to join the same through the Single Point of Contact (SPOC) Mr. Manas Moulic of the department of English. SPOC helps the students (present and ex- students as well) to enroll and register into any such course and arrange a centre for the ensuing examination in consultation with the respective Course Co-ordinators of the NPTEL
- Sending them for Project work/Summer School etc. in other institution
- Keeping a track of such students' progression to other National institutes of repute (e.g. IIT, ISI, IISc, TIFR

etc. including State and Central Universities) after completion of UG/PG in our College

7.1.1 - Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the year

At the core of Ramakrishna-Vivekananda ideology burns bright the

lamp of human dignity, borrowing as it does the light of the immortal Self resident in every being. Every person, this ideology reinforces in no uncertain manner, is to be looked upon in terms of his/her underlying divine essence - all other descriptions of a person being incidental at best. Indeed, this ideal runs so deep in the modus operandi of our college that in principle there remains no scope for gender-inequity to rear its ugly head in any conceivable manner. It's important to note however that in the context of our college, traditionally a boys' college, the common-sense notion of gender-equity mostly morphs itself into the idea of propriety towards the other gender. Below we touch upon a few measures allied with this idea.

- The college has its own share of organizing seminars, symposiums, and workshops alike in which women participation is surely no rarity. Anticipating such turnout, This ashrama is liberally studded with infrastructural outposts such as common room, guest room etc which can temporarily house the woman visitors to the campus , ensuring their safety and security.
- The College culture enjoins on every student to put the highest premium on according genuine respect to every human being. Such repeated counselling has resulted in our boys displaying exemplary moral behavior in course of their interactions with others - in particular, with the other gender.
- During the relief work and service activities conducted in different villages, our college students serves the village women as their mother. So after the camp is over, all villagers greeted all the students of our college so warmly. Our college organise free Eye operation camp for the poor and destitute persons. Every year out of 50-60 patients are operated free of cost, but 30 to 35 women out of the total patients are operated. Our students took all responsibility i.e. pre-operative screening and post-operative measures, etc.

Cleaning department of the College that runs under the exclusive supervision of a monastic member, has its own designated staff and equipment. The entire college compound have sufficient number of litter bins installed. The solid waste thus accumulated is routinely disposed off through the standard arrangement with the local municipality. The sewage system of the College is connected to the main drainage system of the municipality, which in turn is connected to the STP for recycling of liquid sewers by the municipality. Regular waste food from canteen and garden is disposed by designated staff, a part of which is used in the Solid waste management system of the college to make good quality manure for their use in garden, while the other part is taken by designated person from local municipality. For Solid waste management the college has a special machine of Reddonatura make. Hazardous chemicals for Chemistry laboratory are stored separately in a shade in the courtyard outside the main College building. However, we do not deal with radioactive materials or substances. E-waste in the form of discarded computers, printers and relative accessories are kept separately in a designated store room of the college and are disposed off from time to time by selling them out to proper agencies.

Moreover, the College officially celebrates the occasions like Christmas-Eve, Buddha Purnima along with Durga Puja, Janmastami, Saraswati Puja, Sivaratri, Dolyatra in the same fervor, where students of every community participate.

The community dining principle as observed here in the Canteen, make everyone to sit together in the canteen and take the food where caste, creed, religion or socio-economic barriers, be it for the distributors, or for the people dining, are completely ignored.

One significant fraction of our students come from socio-economically backward class, there are first generation learners and students coming from families belonging to BPL (below poverty line) category.

Many of these students are helped financially by partial or full free studentship as per their requirements from our side. Our College uniform of all blue Shirt and Trouser leaves no place to discriminate them economically in their physical appearance.

Title of the Practice: 'Character-building Education'

Goal:

Being a part of the Ramakrishna Mission, the Institution is instrumental in giving shape to Swami Vivekananda's ideas regarding education. Swami Vivekananda says 'What is education? Is it book-learning? No. Is it diverse knowledge? Not even that. The training by which the current and expression of will are brought under control and become fruitful is called education.' So according to Vivekananda, a man whose will does not drag him hither and thither but rather he himself possessing full control over his will employs it along positive and beneficial channels is a truly educated man. Such an education which rests on self-control and correct self-exertion is what Vivekananda called 'Man-making, Character-building Education'.

Inspired by such a lofty ideal of education the Institution attempts to inculcate a combination of practical skills to fulfill the basic needs, moral values for a superior inter-personal relationship, spiritual wisdom for a fearless existence.

Practices:

- First of all the very ambience of the Institution instills orderliness and calmness in one and all. As one enters the college the gigantic portraits of Swami Vivekananda as if calls upon the 'sleeping soul' towards a glorious way of life based on self-confidence and self-sacrifice. The main campus welcomes the visitors into the holy precincts of a Universal Temple dedicated to Shri Ramakrishna, the Prophet of Religious harmony. Thus just an unplanned entry into the campus is gifted with an elevating experience. The students having got an opportunity to study in such an environment imbibes the spirit of holiness and serenity within them.
- A number of programmes are arranged to expose the students to the ideals of Indian Culture and Spirituality with a background of Universalism as propounded by the great lives and teachings of Shri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Shri Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda. Some of the important measures taken in this direction to fortify the character of the

youth are given below:

1. Seminars on Swami Vivekananda's ideas are arranged in the college. Eminent speakers from all walks of life starting from Professors coming from Science, Arts and Engineering fields, Vice-Chancellors, Monks of the Ramakrishna Mission and many other dignitaries enlighten the students towards right understanding and implementation of Swamiji's bold and strong ideas. They shed light on different aspects of the great one's life and message like Vivekananda's concepts on Education, Science and Technology, Service, Nation-building, Youth, Human Development and so on. Thus, inspirations run along varying channels and mould the student community according to one's unique tendencies but always in a positive direction.
2. Books on value education and personality development are often distributed among the students free of cost.
3. The young students are given a taste of the bliss involved in selfless service and its efficacy in elevating oneself. During the Annual Voluntary Blood Donation Camp, the Annual Eye Operation Camp etc. the students are given a chance to serve the 'Living-God' as manifested in the form of the suffering patient hailing from dire circumstances.

Evidence of Success:

The healthy interaction between the junior and the senior students without any tinge of ragging or any sort of harassment is a silent evidence for the natural sense of decorum prevalent in the college.

All the students of the college are Day Scholars. They come from far and near to the college every day. As a result they get a chance to mix with the society. So they are able to assess the importance of the values they receive at the college in comparison with the greater societal cross section.

The spirit of selfless service which the students imbibe in their college days often grow in dimensions in future. Many of them while pursuing their higher studies or jobs start their own NGOs for serving the society especially the poor and the afflicted.

Many of our students who are employed in Pharmaceutical Companies spontaneously come forward to supply medicines and eye drops for our Eye camp. Some of our students donate generously for the betterment of the college.

Many renowned ex-students of our college when invited for a talk come and emphasise the issue of moral growth to the students which they had once learnt from the college and from the inspiring ideas of Swami Vivekananda.

**Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

The society is still not yet unanimous towards the initiation of character-building education system as a vital and urgent requirement. Hence it is the institution alone that stresses the need for such a necessity along with few guardian, teachers and students in favour of such a move.

**Title of the Practice:**

'A parallel Research wing along with curricular academics'

**Goal:** The institution feels that it is necessary to pursue research along with the regular curriculum to create a deep-rooted academic ambience. The main reason behind it is the common observation that a fixed curriculum with minor changes often leads to stereotyped teaching-learning process. Whereas, research brings about creativity and exploration along newer avenues. For the faculty, research helps them to get greater grasp over the subject and opens the windows to explore the recent findings in the field of science. For the students this offers a glimpse beyond the walls of curriculum. The taste of a few drops trickling down from the research world will motivate them to pursue higher studies and research in Pure Science in future. This is vital for the nation since the students engaged in serious research work in pure science should increase and complement the growth in Technology.

**The Practice:**

- Every Department has worked on minor research projects.
- The Department of Botany, Zoology and Mathematics have major research projects.
- All total 8 Research scholars have taken admission for their Doctoral thesis in the college during the year. Out of them 6 Research scholars are in the Department of Botany , 1 Research scholar is in the Department of Zoology and 1 Research scholar in the Department of Mathematics.
- Till now 10 scholars have completed their Ph. D. research work from the college.
- The thrust areas in major Research Projects are Inorganic Chemistry, Plant Tissue Culture, Mycopathology, Complex

Analysis, Real Analysis, Ecology etc.

- Most of the research projects are funded by UGC, DST etc.
- The college has a well-equipped lab infrastructure for research. A rich collection of sophisticated instruments including HPTLC, UV & IR Spectrophotometers, Fluorometer, Freeze Dryer, Geldoc, Growth Chamber, Leica microscopes etc. are supporting the rapid growth of research.
- The research wing has not been kept divorced from the rest of the college curriculum.
  
- The PG students must work on some project in these research labs.
- Often the Research scholars guide the UG and PG students in Laboratory classes.
- The interaction between the UG and PG students with the Research Labs is highly beneficial for developing a creative knack in the subject.
- The findings in the research labs have been able to find a place in peer-reviewed journals.

#### Evidence of Success:

- The college has turned out to be an important centre for research. The publications prove the quality of research.
- Some of our faculty members have patent over their research outcomes. For e.g. In Mycopathology Lab one patent has been filed.
- Research scholars from other reputed Institutes come to our research labs for summer projects or for using our instrumental facility.
- Several collaborative research schemes are active with other Research Institutes.
- Seven Research scholars have already been awarded the Doctoral Degree.
- Retention of many faculty members with research aptitude has been possible by this well-established research facility in the college.
- The college is self-sufficient to carry on PG project works at the college itself with the support of the Research Labs.
- Unlike typical Research Institutes, the Research scholars get a chance to guide the UG and PG practical classes which gives them a teaching experience.

- The main crisis felt in the field of research is the



financial crunch. With exorbitantly expensive instruments, chemicals and reagents the smooth and unhindered research work at college level at times comes into question.

## 1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

The college integrates the principle 'man-making and character-

building' in harmony with the various present day's issues like Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in its curriculum.

**Professional Ethics:** Proper understanding of the subjects and its applications and scopes, exposure to recent advances in research and individual project works and field studies lay the foundation for easy access to employment among our students. It also helps to inculcate the professionalism in career. Each practical based paper has one portion related to Good Laboratory Practice for better performance in laboratory. Moreover, in The course work of Ph.D. students one portion is present which is called Research Ethics.

**Gender:** The College is an integral part of the Ramakrishna Mission working along the lines laid down by great personalities like Sri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Sri Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda. They had always preached highest reverence for all, both men and women, as the veritable manifestations of God. Imbibing that spirit, the institution advocates worshipful adoration for every human being. This idea is inculcated informally through the daily inter-personal dealings and conversations and formally through seminars and discourses on the ideals of the Ramakrishna Mission. It is to be noted that though the college is only for male students but highest honour and glory of women as the Divine Mother Herself is an integral feature of the institution. During the Annual Free Cataract operation, many women patients along with other male patients are also admitted for the operation and served with due care and honour by the students, staff and volunteers in the college itself. In the Genetics portion of Botany, Zoology and Microbiology students deals the scientific study of the gender issues and its role in heredity and progeny.

**Human Values:** As already pointed out, the institution inculcates the spirit of reverence and service towards all through a very natural way. However, any complaint or grievance is given a patient hearing and necessary actions are taken accordingly. The college has introduced the Value Education and Indian Culture in its Skill Enhancement Course. Moreover many courses are taught each year as the certificate course for adding values in the existing curriculum.

**Environment and Sustainability:** It is an integral part of the curriculum provided by the College and is common for all the Departments. Field studies pertaining to the Dept. of Botany,

## 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

Evaluation is the only measurement of an individual's education. The very process of assessment begins with an admission test followed by viva voce. Further stages of assessment are as follows:

- In the first few weeks of education, each department tries its best to find out the weakness and strengths of their newcomers.
- Every department has their program and curriculum to help their students with their specific requirement. Deficiency and proficiency on any issues are identified at the early stages of education. There are programs like short bridge courses, language, and technical skill development, and personal guidance to overcome the student's weaknesses as well as enhance their proficiencies. Outside of these curricula students are guided separately.
- Every department tries to follow a few programs to provide extra care and guidance to the students separately, who fail to perform up to the mark in their annual examination.
- Each department arranges remedial courses as per their need.
- There are provisions of bridge courses for weaker

students. Few special classes are organized for these students to achieve the expected level of knowledge. In addition to this, there are also group and one to one discussion.

- The departments facilitated with laboratory arrange a special program for newcomer students, to make them familiar with various instruments and tools.
- Each department tries to focus on a three-tire format to find out Advanced learners: a) performance in the admission test and interview, b) classroom interaction, and c) performance in the institutional examinations.

The college helps and guides its advanced students to reach the pinnacle of efficiencies in various ways:

- The college provides special coaching with internal teachers and external experts for national/state-level competitive examinations like JAM, JEST; entrance tests for ISI, IACS, IISERS, JNU, JU, or other universities, etc at the UG level. For the PG level students are prepared for M.Phil, Ph.D. entrance tests, as well as NET, SET, GATE, SSC, etc.
- Apart from all these, advanced students are encouraged to take participate in various academic discourses inside and outside the institution.

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and

problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

Teachers in this institute believe that education should address the distinct learning needs, interests, and aspirations of individual students. To accomplish this goal, teachers engage the students in a wide variety of methods-from modifying assignments and instructional strategies in the classroom to entirely redesign the students are grouped and taught. #### 2.3.4 - Preparation and adherence to Academic Calendar and Teaching Plans by the institution

- The college Prospectus gives a clear idea of our courses offered, the history of the college, the disciplines to be maintained in the college campus.
- The college has a detailed academic calendar which is distributed to the students at the commencement of every academic session.
- The teachers of every Department, at the beginning of the each semester and during the semester as well, elaborately discusses with the students about the teaching plans-its design, progress, difficulties in implementation, modification and receive feedbacks from the students. A strict adherence and maintenance in regards to the academic calendar are followed and the same is distributed among the students and the teachers.
- Our college organizes a parent-teacher meeting in general with the administration and also with the respective

departments where they can get the progress report of their ward from the teachers and they also voice their issues and concerns for teaching plans and mental counselling.

- The teachers of different departments meet together with the Examination Committee, IQAC and administration to analyse academic calendar, evaluation issues and teaching plans the modalities, expectations, shortcomings, constrains and strategies to overcome difficulties.
- At the very beginning of each semester the respective Departments prepare a detailed routine, a study plan for each individual course and assignments for evaluating the course. The teachers are allocated classes in the routine which is displayed at the students' notice board in front of the respective departments. Assignments are also specified for the teachers for each semester and put up in the departmental notice board.
- The Administration and/or Department of Controller of Examinations holds a meeting at the beginning of every academic year with the students to orient them for the examinations pattern, schedule and regulations. These details are put up on the notice board as well.
- Individual teacher provides course outline and course schedule prepared by the respective departments at the commencement of each semester.
- The success of the process is maintained through effective monitoring by the Principal/Controller of Examinations /HODs. Through the full cooperation of all teaching staffs all the departments have completed the entire teaching learning and assessment process within the stipulated time.

- The college examination system is monitored under the supervision of a well structured Department of Controller of Examinations and Examination Committee. There is one designated Controller of Examinations assisted by a Assistant Controller of Examinations.
- CoE has designated staff members, Data Entry Operator and IT technician.
- An Examination Management System has been developed over the years through the deployment of ICT.
- The entire examination system is automated that includes Notification for examinations for different stake holders at different levels, Registration Generation, Admit Card generation, Award

- At present, the college follows CGPA system in grading.
- The semester system of the college has been introduced since 2017.

The steps/medium taken by the college to inform and aware the students about the evaluation processes are:

- Notice display in college.
- Briefing to students by the Principal and the Controller of Examinations
- All departments follow internal-external expertise combination in paper setting, moderation, and evaluation in UG and PG Programs to achieve utmost objectivity in the grading of marks.
- The Controller of Examination maintains a peer-reviewer group to examine draft question papers before finalization. Further modification and improvisation are done to provide error-free question papers to examinees.
- Evaluators are encouraged to point out mistakes and put corrective remark while evaluating a paper so that a student will benefit when they get to relook their paper.
- Students can get a chance to appeal for re- evaluation.
- Besides this, the college provides an academic calendar in advance. However, students are given opportunities to appeal for substitute dates of examination within the fixed tenure while considering personal constraints.
- After the finalization of the examination schedule, a draft copy is circulated among all departments and to students. After receiving all the feedback and necessary guidance of modulation the examination schedule is finalized. This final schedule is strictly maintained.
- Students are being intimated about the schedule of

examination in advance.

- The controller of examination reserves its confidentiality while dispersing answer scripts or paper setting and moderation to external experts as well as collecting them. The entire process is done by the office staff personally. All these stages have smoothened the entire examination exercise within the schedule.

Attainment of this college can be briefed in the following manner :

- Pass percentage of the college is almost 100 in last one decade.
- Drop out is almost nil in this period.
- Although in some papers, students are required to appear in some arrear papers, but considering the total number of papers and students, it is also negligible, specially in core courses.
- Students of UG level, in maximum, prefer to opt for higher studies. Many students get chances to study in institutes like ISI, TIFR, IISC, IACS, IITs, IISERS, NIBMG, BHU, HCU etc. It is interesting to note that a good number of students get chances to study I-PhD programmes competing with the students of PG levels of other institutes.
- Some students opt for jobs - in private sector or in public sector. They also crack it within a couple of years.
- Students studying this college feel an urge to know more and thus they opt for different summer programmes, internships and some also take up some courses through online mode (NPTEL, SWAYAM etc).
- The college is also satisfied with the attainment of general Graduate Attributes by the students and it has found that its learners passing out become a true citizen and develop a genuine love for their country and fellow men. ### RESEARCH, INNOVATIONS AND EXTENSION

#### 3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities

3.1.1 - The institution's research facilities are frequently updated and there is a well-defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

**Research policies:** We have a well-formed Research Policy made under the guidance of our Research Committee, while the corresponding departments have their Ph.D. committees. This policy is regularly revised, updated and uploaded in our website. We take appropriate measures to maintain the research ethics according to the latest UGC guideline. Possible plagiarism detection is done through a software available in our affiliating university.

**Research facilities:** We have State-of-the-art research laboratories for Physics and Chemistry departments, with sophisticated instruments like Flow Cyclometer, Flourimeter, IR Spectrophotometer, Flash Chromatography, Cyclic Voltmeter, HPLC, HPTLC, GCMS, and several high-end servers. All these high-end equipment and servers are maintained under respective AMC.

**Promotion of Research:** In commemoration of 150th Birth Anniversary of Swami Vivekananda, we conceived in 2013 the establishment of a research Centre in our College. In persuasion to this idea, we duly got recognized as a research Centre under West Bengal State University. The University then granted us the permission to start Swami Vivekananda Centre for Multidisciplinary Research in Basic Science and Social Science to conduct Ph.D. courses. We conduct Course-work towards registration of enrolled Ph.D. scholars, where a special focus is given on the Research Methodologies as an integral part of the course work. The Institution has the requisite infrastructure to conduct Post-Doctoral Research work also. Reseach centre also facilitates publication of research papers and books/monographs. We have conducted a seminar on IPR (intellectual Property Rights) with a focus on Patent laws of Scientific research.

Even before the formal inception of Reseach Centre, Dr. Chandrakanta Bandyopadhyay and Dr. Tapas Ghosh of Chemistry Department, (registration was under the University of Calcutta), Dr. Biswajit Ghosh of Botany Department (registration was under Calcutta University) and Dr. Swapan Kumar Ghosh of Botany Department (registration was under Kalyani University) were involved in guiding PhD students. After the establishment of Research Centre, we have constructed in due course, a dedicated research wing in the new Annex building, and some young faculties have got involved in research under its aegis.

Some of our students in Computer Science are trained to begin startups on their own. The Skilled oriented PG Diploma course in Agriculture Biotechnology offered by the college is designed to enable the student towards entrepreneurship in Plant Tissue Culture.

Our aim is to**

ignite the young minds in search of knowledge, rather than merely burdening them with ever-growing and overpowering pool of information around us. In other words, it also attends to their overall growth and development so that they may become strong and healthy individuals with sound moral principles, learn to respect higher values of life and become conscious of their obligations to the poor masses around them. It does all this and much else besides, not only by instruction but also by involving the inmates in a series of well-planned activities. This creates an elevating experience for the students towards a feeling of oneness with the society. Towards imbibing these value system every year at the beginning of the academic session (both in UG and PG), we organize number of Induction Programs for the freshers, wherein they get the idea of service to the mankind by giving priority to the benefit of the others in the society at large than their individual interest and benefit. This ideology of giving importance to selfless altruism against petty self-interest is being inculcated amongst our students for past fifty eight years uninterruptedly. This practice is then continued throughout the tenure of their stay here by a well-thought and accordingly designed course on Value education, which is a compulsory part of the curriculum, of which the classes are usually taken the Monastic members of the Ramakrishna Order. We also occasionally organize seminar/workshops on various social emerging issues towards creating social awareness among our students. The impact of this training can be seen in their future life, where many of them are found to get associated with reputed philanthropic serving NGOs and in turn we invite them to interact with us towards training and orienting our students such that they may feel and realize the problems regularly faced by the people in the neighbourhood community. Some alumni even establish such NGO of their own for social service. Every year we organize Blood donation camp at our College through the aegis of Association for Voluntary Blood Donors, WB, where our students and staff donate blood. Moreover, every year we organise a free Eye operation camp ( IOL) for the people residing in remote villages, slums and railway platforms where 50-60 people have been operated and spectacles are also given to them. Ideas pertaining to Communal harmony, Cleanliness (Swachchhata) and environmental awareness are preached and practiced.

Models to aid teaching Dedicated Computer laboratories, apart from the department of Computer Science, in the departments of Mathematics, Physics, Microbiology and Chemistry. All other departments also have their own independent computer facilities as per their academic need. Apart from the College Library and the departmental libraries, we have a District library in the Campus catering to the students and teachers. We have Seminar library in each of the departments with rich collection of reference books which students are allowed to borrow. Access to e-Book and e-journals are made available through Inflibnet. There is a dedicated computer center for the students, with 120 All-in-one computers with internet facility. Photocopying facility is available in the campus. There are separate and fully equipped state-of-the-art laboratories in the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology departments for the students of UG and PG, apart from a number of research laboratories. Students are encouraged to participate in a variety online NPTEL courses, for which our College is a Nodal Centre with one a faculty designated as a one-point contact. The college has one Polyhouse and 2 Green houses.

## 4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

A well-organized and well-maintained library with a rich collection makes the institution even greater. The College Library started its journey way back in 1963 merely with a few almiraahs of books. With the passage of time, it has got bigger and better in all senses - documents, users and staff. The library was earlier situated in the main college building. On 2018 the new College Annex Building was inaugurated and since then the College Library has been shifted to this Annex. The newly built library is housed on 1st floor of the Annex Building.

There is sufficient seating capacity in the Reading Room and it is equipped with different types of books - Text Books, Reference Books, Competitive Books, Journals & Magazines. The e-Library is the new addition to the library which is equipped with 20 All-In-One PCs, Internet connectivity through Wifi, Printer, and 2 OPAC terminals. Both Reading Room and E-Library are under CCTV surveillance. The students are allowed unlimited access to Internet strictly for academic purposes. They are also provided with unlimited Printing facility.

The day-to-day operations of the Library is managed by an Integrated Library Management Software, namely KOHA.

The library subscribes to NLIST (e-ShodhSindhu). The Library has also purchased e-books from renowned publishing house namely Pearson and Springer. The e-books have been purchased on perpetual mode. The Pearson e-books can be accessed from anywhere using user id and password while the Springer e-books can be accessed within the College premises.

6.1.2 - Effective leadership is reflected in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Decentralization and participative management are undoubtedly two interlinked key features for any institute run with a modern outlook towards excellence. While we have several sub-committees constituted with our teaching/non-teaching/monastic members, looking into corresponding matters under their respective jurisdictions, one example of such initiative, that is being followed in our institution can be seen in our ADMISSION PROCESS for both UG and PG level. We highlight some salient features of the same, showcasing our practice in this regard.

- At the suitable time (usually some days before the publication of the result of the corresponding pre-requisite examination [e.g. Higher Secondary for the case of UG, while for PG, final examinations of the UG level] the Principal holds a meeting of the Examination and Admission Committee (which includes all the HOD) to discuss and frame the policy of admission for that year, where the following issues are discussed at length and finalized.
- Eligibility criterion for online filling of the form [viz. Cut-off marks in the last admissible examination ] Subject(s) for which a student has to write the admission test of a particular department
- Date(s) of Admission test (avoiding, if possible, the already announced dates of the other reputed

institutions)

- Selection Criterion (viz. making of specific formula for the preparation of final list, giving appropriate weightages to the marks scored in our admission test and that in specific subject(s) of the qualifying examination, about which the respective Heads come with specific suggestions that are chalked out at their departmental level discussions a priori ).
- Syllabus, Question pattern (MCQ/Short or Broad Answer Type) and distribution of marks.
- Fixing of fees for the form-filling process (to be done ONLINE compulsorily)
- Date of submission of the question paper prepared by the respective departments, and that of the evaluated answer scripts to the Controller of Examination [which is then put in computer for the preparation of the merit list according to the prescribed formula, by the designated members of the College office under the supervision of the Controller of Examination.]
- Specific assignment of duties [Teachers / Non-teaching staff] for the date(s) of Admission test(s), towards smooth operational and logistic support on the particular date(s).
- Date of Counseling for the 1st merit list, 2nd merit list [and a 3rd as well, if necessary for some department]

On the date of admission, all the teaching and non-teaching staff of the College has to attend compulsorily to perform his specific assigned duty towards smooth organization of the Admission test.

After admission Test on the day of Counseling after the publication of the merit list online, the Principal and a few other Monastic Members and the Head of the corresponding department meet the candidate along with his parent/guardian where his need for financial help is assessed and accordingly partial or full free studentship is provided to the needy ones.

## 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ Perspective plan has been clearly articulated and implemented

The college chalks out its strategic plan every year at the outset of the academic session. Concerned bodies and members are consulted and the plans are finalized. After that relevant measures are taken up to deploy the plan.

As it was felt that we are in dearth of space, related to lecture rooms, smart classes, library along with multi-level stack rooms, reading rooms with ICT facilities and, to facilitate the expansion of research laboratories and administrative offices, it was decided in 2014 to solve all these problems through the construction of a new annex building that will provide all these above-mentioned facilities along with a modern state-of-the-art auditorium. The initial financial support was sanctioned by the Govt. of West Bengal. However, thanks to the kind successive financial commitments and or donations of several Well-wishers of the Ramakrishna Mission in general and our Institution in particular, by on 2018 the opening of the 5 storried building with an auditorium with 250 seating capacity.

Library is shifted to the 1st floor of the new building with all facilities like Reading Room, Stack Room, Processing Room, Storage space, etc.

The whole Department of Mathematics is shifted to the 2nd floor of the new building with spacious 2 computer laboratories, PG class rooms and the space for Ph.D. students.

The newly formed Department of Computer Science is housed in the 2nd flood of the building with three well equiped Computer laboratories and spacious classrooms.

Moreover 2 Studios are present on the 1st floor for the preparation of the online study materials for the faculties. A well furnished Language laboratory is also present on the 1st floor.

6 well furnished GUEST Rooms are present in this building which will help for the accomodation of the reputed faculty members from outside the state.

A GYMNASIUM with all state of art equipments is present on the ground floor of the building.

### 6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for their career development/ progression

The institution has always been keen in its approach towards safeguarding the welfare of its employees, teaching or Non-teaching alike. It also facilitates in all possible ways to the career development or progression of all its employees.

For the teachers in substantive Government approved posts, the College

- Encourages them to attend the Faculty development programs like OP [Orientation Program], RC [Refreshers Course] as and when needed for career advancement and professional/academic progression.



- Grants leave-on-duty for attending/addressing [as a resource person], Seminars/Symposiums at Local/National / International levels in India/Abroad
- Grants Sabbatical leave for higher studies (e.g., Ph.D.) as per the UGC and Government rules
- Grants seed money towards travel/registration for attending Seminars/Symposiums, if required
- Timely processes the relevant documents and paper-works towards formation of necessary committees etc. for their career advancement.

For the Non-teaching staff in Government approved posts, the College

Ensures the timely preparation and processing of the documents regarding their Government approved career advancement scheme at the 7th, 10th and 20th years of their service.

There is a staff welfare society, named Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Centenary College Cooperative Credit Society, where all the permanent staffs members (both teaching and non-teaching, in substantive Government payroll) can apply for personal loan whenever necessary, as per the Cooperative rules framed by the Government. It is a registered body, run by the elected Board of Directors chosen out of its members in its AGM and the College provides free of cost the physical infrastructure necessary for running its office and takes the responsibility to deduct the requisite amounts, if any, against the repayment of loans for any loanee member through its accounts department.

Moreover, as and when any staff approaches for loan from his Provident Fund accumulation the college immediately pass his appeal in the Governing Body and arrange quick sanction of the loan from treasury office. After superannuation, all staff members get their pensionary benefits including Leave Salary and Gratuity, etc.

**6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**

## 6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Financial audit of the College is conducted in three phases generally.

1. Internal Audit Team, appointed by the Ramakrishna Math, Belur, appoints one auditor team who audits

- Individual vouchers for all the expenditures
- Bank reconciliation statement
- Professional tax and GST documents

At this stage of audit, the monthly statements of receipts and payments is sent to the Central office of the Ashrama, which is finally submitted to the Ashrama headquarter at Belur Math.

1. A Statutory audit team, appointed by Belur Math, headquarters of RKM Ashrama, which visits the College annually and prepares an annual report on the basis of evaluation of the audit done by the Internal Audit Team. In fact, they check through the four (quarterly) reports of internal audit done by the Internal audit team and also evaluates the action taken with regards to those reports. The team also looks into the Annual bank reconciliation statement, outstanding payments and outstanding receipts, yearly balance sheet, income and expenditure statements, and financial schedule (investment and permanent funds).

2. The Audit Team, appointed by the Government of West Bengal, visits the accounts section of the College once a year and examines the documents related to Government funding, fees and charges of the students, Provident Fund and Tax related documents and also cross checks the Utilization certificates of all the relevant fund received from the Government.

Since the College is SIRO [Scientific and Industrial Research Organization] accredited by DST (Department of Science and Technology) Govt. of India, any devotee of Ramakrishna Mission in general, or any well-wisher of our Institution in particular, who wants to donate towards the research and development of our College, is entitled to get 100% tax exemption for the donation amount, under section 35/1/2 (or 80GGA) of Income Tax act. For this, as per the Government rules we submit every year, the annual audited statement of accounts to the IT department and every three years we have to send necessary documents for the renewal of this scheme.

Two important thrust area of the IQAC:

- We strongly feel that in-depth research is of paramount importance in the advancement of teaching-learning process. That is how, under the active guidance and leadership of IQAC, the College took up several initiatives towards Continuous Expansion of Research Facilities during the last five years as can be seen from the detailed information uploaded in the link. A group of young energetic faculty members took up several research projects and the relevant instrumental up-gradation and procurement of several sophisticated scientific equipment have been done in this period, particularly in the departments of Chemistry, Zoology and Botany. During this period the Research Centre was established in our College, where students can enroll for Ph.D. degree.
- The IQAC in collaboration of the HoDs and administration regularly monitors the academic progress of the students. At the end of the each examination there is an analysis with HoDs to identify the slow learners and advanced ones and decide the steps to be adopted for both the groups as required. In fact, the learning outcomes of the students are discussed almost at individual level and the students are called and / or met individually and collectively to know their suggestions and / or constraints. After admission also,

students learning levels come under the scrutiny and suitable bridge courses are organised at departmental level. For slow learners remedial sessions are organised and for the advanced learners seminars, workshops etc are conducted. They are also encouraged to take part in internship or summer courses organised by other reputed institutes. Final performance of our learners are also mapped with the courses offered at the end of the programme by the IQAC along with HoDs.

Introduction of CBCS for both UG and PG programs. The education plays enormously significant role in building of a nation. As an educational institution, engaged in imparting knowledge, we have entered into semester system with CBCS pattern prescribed by UGC. Under the active guidance of IQAC, from 2017, we introduced CBCS with credit based grading system for all UG courses. Then from the academic session 2018, we introduced CBCS with credit based grading system for all PG courses.

Direct Surveillance of IQAC After every End-Semester examination of our College, once the result is prepared, the IQAC meets to supervise the development of the students and suggest required mentoring/guidance/remedial measures to them through their respective heads of the departments, who are invited to attend those meetings, unless they were members of IQAC.

For advanced students 1.Departmental Seminar by invited experts of the corresponding fields to expose them to the frontiers of their knowledge domain so as to motivate such students towards research 2.Special coaching for different National/State level competitive examinations by the help of the college teachers and by the help of the external agencies.

- Our College being the local chapter of NPTEL, an online

platform for learning almost any subject across various disciplines at any time of a day, the advanced students are encouraged to join the same through the Single Point of Contact (SPOC) Mr. Manas Moulic of the department of English. SPOC helps the students (present and ex-students as well) to enroll and register into any such course and arrange a centre for the ensuing examination in consultation with the respective Course Co-ordinators of the NPTEL

- Sending them for Project work/Summer School etc. in other institution
- Keeping a track of such students' progression to other National institutes of repute (e.g. IIT, ISI, IISc, TIFR etc. including State and Central Universities) after completion of UG/PG in our College

For academically backward students: Remedial Coaching at the departmental level For all the Students in general: Mentoring under specified teacher assigned to each of them right from the beginning of the semester. #### 7.1.1 - Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the year

At the core of Ramakrishna-Vivekananda ideology burns bright the lamp of human dignity, borrowing as it does the light of the immortal Self resident in every being. Every person, this ideology reinforces in no uncertain manner, is to be looked upon in terms of his/her underlying divine essence - all other descriptions of a person being incidental at best. Indeed, this ideal runs so deep in the modus operandi of our college that in principle there remains no scope for gender-inequity to rear its ugly head in any conceivable manner. It's important to note however that in the context of our college, traditionally a boys' college, the common-sense notion of gender-equity mostly morphs itself into the idea of propriety towards the other gender. Below we touch upon a few measures allied with this idea.

- The college has its own share of organizing seminars, symposiums, and workshops alike in which women participation is surely no rarity. Anticipating such turnout, This ashrama is liberally studded with infrastructural outposts such as common room, guest room etc which can temporarily house the woman visitors to the campus , ensuring their safety and security.
- The College culture enjoins on every student to put the highest premium on according genuine respect to every human being. Such repeated counselling has resulted in our boys displaying exemplary moral behavior in course of their interactions with others - in particular, with the other gender.

- During the relief work and service activities conducted in different villages, our college students serves the village women as their mother. So after the camp is over, all villagers greeted all the students of our college so warmly. Our college organise free Eye operation camp for the poor and destitute persons. Every year out of 50-60 patients are operated free of cost, but 30 to 35 women out of the total patients are operated. Our students took all responsibility i.e. pre-operative screening and post-operative measures, etc.

Cleaning department of the College that runs under the exclusive supervision of a monastic member, has its own designated staff and equipment. The entire college compound have sufficient number of litter bins installed. The solid waste thus accumulated is routinely disposed off through the standard arrangement with the local municipality. The sewage system of the College is connected to the main drainage system of the municipality, which in turn in connected to the STP for recycling of liquid sewers by the municipality. Regular waste food from canteen and garden is disposed by designated staff, a part of which is used in the Solid waste management system of the college to make good quality manure for their use in garden, while the other part is taken by designated person

from local municipality. For Solid waste management the college has a special machine of Reddonatura make. Hazardous chemicals for Chemistry laboratory are stored separately in a shade in the courtyard outside the main College building. However, we do not deal with radioactive materials or substances. E-waste in the form of discarded computers, printers and relative accessories are kept separately in a designated store room of the college and are disposed off from time to time by selling them out to proper agencies.

The community dining principle as observed here in the Canteen, make everyone to sit together in the canteen and take the food where caste, creed, religion or socio-economic barriers, be it for the distributors, or for the people dining, are completely ignored.

One significant fraction of our students come from socio-economically backward class, there are first generation learners and students coming from families belonging to BPL (below poverty line) category.

Many of these students are helped financially by partial or full free studentship as per their requirements from our side. Our College uniform of all blue Shirt and Trouser leaves no place to discriminate them economically in their physical appearance.

**Title of the Practice: 'Character-building Education'**

**Goal:**

Being a part of the Ramakrishna Mission, the Institution is instrumental in giving shape to Swami Vivekananda's ideas regarding education. Swami Vivekananda says 'What is education? Is it book-learning? No. Is it diverse knowledge? Not even that. The training by which the current and expression of will are brought under control and become fruitful is called education.' So according to Vivekananda, a man whose will does not drag him hither and thither but rather he himself

possessing full control over his will employs it along positive and beneficial channels is a truly educated man. Such an education which rests on self-control and correct self-exertion is what Vivekananda called 'Man-making, Character-building Education'.

Inspired by such a lofty ideal of education the Institution attempts to inculcate a combination of practical skills to fulfill the basic needs, moral values for a superior inter-personal relationship, spiritual wisdom for a fearless existence.

#### Practices:

- First of all the very ambience of the Institution instills orderliness and calmness in one and all. As one enters the college the gigantic portraits of Swami Vivekananda as if calls upon the 'sleeping soul' towards a glorious way of life based on self-confidence and self-sacrifice. The main campus welcomes the visitors into the holy precincts of a Universal Temple dedicated to Shri Ramakrishna, the Prophet of Religious harmony. Thus just an unplanned entry into the campus is gifted with an elevating experience. The students having got an opportunity to study in such an environment imbibe the spirit of holiness and serenity within them.
- A number of programmes are arranged to expose the students to the ideals of Indian Culture and Spirituality with a background of Universalism as propounded by the great lives and teachings of Shri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Shri Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda. Some of the important measures taken in this direction to fortify the character of the youth are given below:
  1. Seminars on Swami Vivekananda's ideas are arranged in the college. Eminent speakers from all walks of life starting from Professors coming from Science, Arts and Engineering fields, Vice-Chancellors, Monks of the Ramakrishna Mission and many other dignitaries enlighten the students towards right understanding and implementation of Swamiji's bold and strong ideas. They shed light on different aspects of the great one's life and message like Vivekananda's concepts on Education, Science and Technology, Service, Nation-building, Youth, Human Development and so on. Thus, inspirations run along varying channels and mould the student community

according to one's unique tendencies but always in a positive direction.

2. Books on value education and personality development are often distributed among the students free of cost.
3. The young students are given a taste of the bliss involved in selfless service and its efficacy in elevating oneself. During the Annual Voluntary Blood Donation Camp, the Annual Eye Operation Camp etc. the students are given a chance to serve the 'Living-God' as manifested in the form of the suffering patient hailing from dire circumstances.

#### Evidence of Success:

The healthy interaction between the junior and the senior students without any tinge of ragging or any sort of harassment is a silent evidence for the natural sense of decorum prevalent in the college.

All the students of the college are Day Scholars. They come from far and near to the college every day. As a result they get a chance to mix with the society. So they are able to assess the importance of the values they receive at the college in comparison with the greater societal cross section.

The spirit of selfless service which the students imbibe in their college days often grow in dimensions in future. Many of them while pursuing their higher studies or jobs start their own NGOs for serving the society especially the poor and the afflicted.

Many of our students who are employed in Pharmaceutical Companies spontaneously come forward to supply medicines and eye drops for our Eye camp. Some of our students donate generously for the betterment of the college.

Many renowned ex-students of our college when invited for a talk come and emphasise the issue of moral growth to the students which they had once learnt from the college and from the inspiring ideas of Swami Vivekananda.

#### Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

The society is still not yet unanimous towards the initiation of character-building education system as a vital and urgent requirement. Hence it is the institution alone that stresses

the need for such a necessity along with few guardian, teachers and students in favour of such a move.

Title of the Practice:

'A parallel Research wing along with curricular academics'

Goal: The institution feels that it is necessary to pursue research along with the regular curriculum to create a deep-rooted academic ambience. The main reason behind it is the common observation that a fixed curriculum with minor changes often leads to stereotyped teaching-learning process. Whereas, research brings about creativity and exploration along newer avenues. For the faculty, research helps them to get greater grasp over the subject and opens the windows to explore the recent findings in the field of science. For the students this offers a glimpse beyond the walls of curriculum. The taste of a few drops trickling down from the research world will motivate them to pursue higher studies and research in Pure Science in future. This is vital for the nation since the students engaged in serious research work in pure science should increase and complement the growth in Technology.

The Practice:

- Every Department has worked on minor research projects.
- The Department of Botany, Zoology and Mathematics have major research projects.
- All total 8 Research scholars have taken admission for their Doctoral thesis in the college during the year. Out of them 6 Research scholars are in the Department of Botany , 1 Research scholar is in the Department of Zoology and 1 Research scholar in the Department of Mathematics.
- Till now 10 scholars have completed their Ph. D. research work from the college.
- The thrust areas in major Research Projects are Inorganic Chemistry, Plant Tissue Culture, Mycopathology, Complex Analysis, Real Analysis, Ecology etc.
- Most of the research projects are funded by UGC, DST etc.
- The college has a well-equipped lab infrastructure for research. A rich collection of sophisticated instruments including HPTLC, UV & IR Spectrophotometers, Fluorometer, Freeze Dryer, Geldoc, Growth Chamber, Leica microscopes etc. are supporting the rapid growth of research.
- The research wing has not been kept divorced from the

rest of the college curriculum.

- The PG students must work on some project in these research labs.
- Often the Research scholars guide the UG and PG students in Laboratory classes.
- The interaction between the UG and PG students with the Research Labs is highly beneficial for developing a creative knack in the subject.
- The findings in the research labs have been able to find a place in peer-reviewed journals.

#### Evidence of Success:

- The college has turned out to be an important centre for research. The publications prove the quality of research.
- Some of our faculty members have patent over their research outcomes. For e.g. In Mycopathology Lab one patent has been filed.
- Research scholars from other reputed Institutes come to our research labs for summer projects or for using our instrumental facility.
- Several collaborative research schemes are active with other Research Institutes.
- Seven Research scholars have already been awarded the Doctoral Degree.
- Retention of many faculty members with research aptitude has been possible by this well-established research facility in the college.
- The college is self-sufficient to carry on PG project works at the college itself with the support of the Research Labs.
- Unlike typical Research Institutes, the Research scholars get a chance to guide the UG and PG practical classes which gives them a teaching experience.

- The main crisis felt in the field of research is the financial crunch. With exorbitantly expensive instruments, chemicals and reagents the smooth and unhindered research work at college level at times comes into question.
